THE NEW STRATEGY FOR SOS CHILDREN'S VILLAGES: Local capacity building!

Empowering local care systems:

- Close cooperation and educations for local staff
- SOS Mothers move out as foster parents
- Family reunion programs
- Small business & health support for women
- Training local parents and foster families, refugee and urban high-risk children

139 SOSCV FAIRSTART INSTRUCTORS EDUCATED Rwanda, Tanzania, Zanzibar, Kenya and Ethiopia

They train groups of foster, kinship, and local parents and social workers. Covered:15.000 children and youth.

Instructors and parents have formed strong mutual support groups.

Child development improved by 20 %

Governments approve and include the program.

Next step: A program for Somalia.





THE EDUCATION : A STARTUP SEMINAR FOLLOWED BY A 6 MONTH ONLINE CLASSROOM



Online classrooms save 80 % of education budgets Student peer feedback, daily online support from Fairstart Electronic registration of child and caregiver progress Each instructor trains a group of foster/ kinship/ or parents 8 times three hours -This creates a strong local support group





Quality in Alternative Care

Scientific evaluation: Prelimenary findings and next steps

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Steps of the program evaluation

1. Feasibility: 💊

- Demand
- Applicability
- Acceptibility

2. Effectivness:

- Does the programm increase parenting skills?
- Does the programm improve children's well-being?

→ Limited effectiveness from uncontrolled programm evaluations, e.g. child development improved by 20%.

Intermediate step: development of an instrument to measure the effectiveness

Testing the psychometric quality of screening tools for the well-being of children and caregivers in alternative care-settings: a multi-informant study with families in Tanzania

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- 124 caregivers
- 99 children (57 girls, Mage = 9.30, SD = 4.65, range 3–17)
- Scorecard A showed good internal consistency and test-retest-reliability across age groups. Significant
 associations with the SDQ indicate convergent validity.
- The internal consistency of Scorecard B was acceptable in the questionnaire and good in the interviewer rating, while re-test-reliability and inter-rater reliability were moderate. Associations with established measures of well-being and resources provided evidence for convergent validity.

→ The Scorecards hold promise as brief screening tools to identify children and caregivers with difficulties and evaluate intervention programs in low-resource contexts.

Testing the effectivness with a multi-site cluster-randomized controlled trial

- Does the programm improve children's well-being?
