





3 Year Home-Based Curriculum 30 Weeks Per Year

Training and Fidelity of the Model

- Intensive 1-week training
- Weekly staff meetings where home visitors role play with themselves
- Role play with the practice child
- Role play with the parent
- Coordinator conducts at least one monitoring of home visitors each year
- On-going training of promote the professional development to home visitors




Evaluating Children's Short term Outcomes

- Coordinator's Quarterly Reports
- Feedback from HIPPY trainers and several Friends of Liberia visitors
- Parent/caregiver feedback survey
- Home visitor surveys



Second Quarter Narrative (January — April 2019)

We-care/Friends of Liberia/HIPPY Family Literacy Initiative (FLI)





Typical Content of Quarterly Reports

- Recruitment and Enrollment
- Number of home visits
- Group meetings and participant information
- Summary of:
 - accomplishments for the quarter
 - implementation challenges and steps taken to address them; and
 - recommendations for improving implementation and outcomes.



Parent Feedback Survey Key Findings

- 98% (109 of 111) of parents indicated the program had been "very helpful":
 - in showing how to teach their child
 - in helping them talk to their child
- About 2/3 had some difficulty in doing program activities
- About 1/2 indicated some difficulty in reading materials
- About 1/3 requested help in increasing their literacy skills and/or educational level



Using Feedback

 Initial and ongoing success of the program led to its expansion in years 2 and 3.

Liberianization of the books and materials

 Feedback from coordinator, parents, and home visitors led to the piloting of an Adult Literacy
 Program in 2019



Policy Implications and Lessons Learned



Broader Impact and Policy Implications

 FLI's home visiting model is included in the National Early Childhood Professional Framework in Liberia.

• FLI has been incorporated in the Nurturing Care Framework in Liberia (Prenatal – 3yr). A pilot has been funded by the Open Society Foundations and two sites will have both the nurturing care elements and the education focus through FLI.



Lessons Learned

- Each partner's role is critical
- Open communication is essential
- Retention of committed staff is crucial
- Data collection and program evaluation is vital
- Staff-community relationship is key
- Culturally adaptable curriculum is needed
- Obtaining funding is challenging
