





#### PROCESS: SUPPORTIVE FRAMEWORK INDEX

- 1.Is there a publicly available registry or database of childcare providers?
- 2.Is there a clearly outlined application procedure for *parents* to request financial support for childcare services?
- 3.Is there a clearly outlined application procedure for *non-state childcare providers* to request financial support for childcare services?
- 4. Has the government published any reports on the *quality* of childcare services?

#### OUTCOME:

## **EXPERT OPINION** INDEX




#### CHILDCARE INDICATOR: PRELIMINARY RESULTS IN A NUTSHELL



# Childcare legal score, by region OECD high income 88.2















